




Being a Good Citizen in your Country

Why is it necessary to become a good citizen?

- You are a part of your country, and as you grow up you will want to take your share of what life has to offer you. What you take and give will depend on the qualities that you put to work for yourself.
- Be a thinking citizen, not a thoughtless one. Keep yourself informed of the happenings of the day in your own community, your country, and throughout the world. Learn how your country, your state, your city, town or shire is governed and how you fit into the government.
- Discover where the government is strong and where it is weak. Do your part as a citizen in the big task of upholding its strengths and overcoming its weaknesses. In many countries, Pathfinders are considered model citizens. What can you do to strengthen that reputation in your country?
- Be prepared to do your part in smaller tasks in such everyday things as obeying traffic regulations, observing the rules of the game when you play, and many other things.

Give the rights and responsibilities of a citizen of your country

We all have human rights, some of these include

- 1. Right to life, liberty and security
- 2. Privacy
- 3. Right to vote
- 4. Right to good health
- 5. Right to an education

We all have human rights to ensure we can all enjoy them, we must be aware of our responsibility to protect the human rights of others

Describe what you can do as a citizen to help your church and country.

- Getting involved!
- Edmund Burke, an English philosopher summed this up when he said "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."
- In your church, this means that you will show up for services on a regular basis. It also means you will support it with your tithes and offering, show up for business meetings, and not wait to be asked before you volunteer your services. If you see something that needs done, do it. If you do not have the skill to do it, or you think that you need permission first, talk to your pastor, an elder, deacon, or deaconess. Find your ministry!
- For your country, it is much the same. Show up for public meetings, stay informed about the issues of the day, vote if you are eligible, and pay your taxes fairly and promptly.

Go through the steps of an individual acquiring citizenship in the country and learn how this is done.

- 1. Be over 18 years old
- 2. Be of "good character"
- 3. Be currently living in the UK
- 4. Meet the English language requirements
- 5. Pass the life in the UK test

Know how to explain the process of government in your country.

- In the UK the Prime Minister leads the government with the support of the cabinet ministers
- Government is made up of departments: education, ministry of defence and department for work and pension.
- Civil service does the practical and administrative work of the government. This section is managed by the primeminister
- Devolved government: Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland are devolved government and are responsible for many of their own local policies.

Explain why laws are established in your country.

- Laws regulate every aspect of life. From the legal requirement of registering a child's birth to regulating what happens to property after death. The law dictates what can and cannot be done. Categories which laws fall under are:
 - Criminal law: covers crime or offenses
 - Civil law: Private maters between individuals
 - Employment law: relationships between employees and employers
 - Family law: family related matters
